RESOLUTION ON HYDROFRACKING BAN IN TOWN OF KIRKLAND

April 27, 2011

WHEREAS, the Town of Kirkland lies above the natural gas deposit area known as the Utica Shale, and is close to the larger Marcellus Shale, which is of intense interest to the gas industry and its agents, and thus there is near certainty that high-volume Hydraulic Fracturing (Hydrofracking) will occur on local land leased by landowners to the industry; and

WHEREAS, Hydrofracking extracts natural gas through deep wells that extend for thousands of feet vertically and up to one mile horizontally by the injection of millions of gallons of water, sand, and toxic chemicals under tremendous pressure and threatens aquifers, wells, and surface water, and because the ‡uid ("produced water') that returns to the surface is contaminated with toxic chemicals and radioactive elements and is then stored in pits or trucked to unequipped water treatment plants; and

WHEREAS, the construction of each Hydrofracking well on approximately 5 acres of land involves a well head structure, storage tank(s), and possible "produced water' evaporation pit, and the continuing operation of each well with water hauling and waste disposal requiring hundreds of heavy trucks trips will transform each into an industrial site; and

WHEREAS, Hydrofracking is exempt from the regulations of the Safe Water Drinking Act and the Clean Air Act, and the New York State moratorium on the issuance of Hydrofracking permits will expire this summer, and the issuance of future permits will be determined when the understaffed and under-funded New York State Department of Environmental Protection releases its new regulations this year, and because significant changes to New York's water laws now being considered by the state legislature fail to address the vast amounts of water used and contaminated in Hydrofracking; and

WHEREAS, New York municipalities have the opportunity to observe and research the environmental and public health impact resulting from the drilling of many thousands of Hydrofracking wells in neighboring Pennsylvania; and
